Coyote

This month's animal is the Coyote (canis latrans) which means 'barking dog'. The coyote is one of 8 native North American wild dogs in the Canidae family, which includes wolves and foxes. The Eastern Coyote, which is here in PEI, is larger than the Canadian western coyotes, attributed to the interbreeding with timber wolves as they travelled eastward across Canada. They are capable of long treks across the ice flows, and were first reported being seen in PEI in 1983. Coyotes mate in late winter, and the monogamous pair together raise litters of 5-7 young pups born in April or May. The pups become independent and move out usually by Fall. Coyotes are most active at dusk to dawn, and have excellent eyesight and smell. They eat a variety of food, including but not limited to snowshoe hare, mice, poultry, insects, berries, grass seed, voles, squirrels, muskrats, apples and carrion (dead animals).



PEI PLANT SPOTLIGHT



Usnea

commonly known as Old Man's Beard

Usnea is a green-vellow lichen found growing on trees (often dead spruce) wooded areas i n throughout PEI. It grows slowly, staying on the trees throughout the seasons. Usnea has a white stretchy 'elastic' thread interior, differentiating it from other lichen species. The presence of Usnea in an area is an indication of healthy air. Usnea has been used traditionally as a medicine against infection, both internal and external, often being prepared as a tincture, powder, tea, infused oil, or salve. Dry Usnea also makes a great fire-starter.
